


LET THE BEAUTY OF NATURE LEAVE ITS FOOTPRINTS ON YOUR SOUL. Peggy Anderson

Only the brilliance of Africa could have overshadowed that great start to 2009. Gathering up a terrific group of adventurers, we set out to soak up the heart and soul of Africa. Tapping into the wild jewels of Tanzania, we went from being surrounded by elephants in the Tarangire, to sipping Sundowners atop Kikoti Rock, having a cheetah posing with her four cubs beside our vehicles, and dancing with the Maasai in their boma. Our small group piled encounter upon encounter, and Africa gave us her best. I wish you could have been there with us!

Coming back to reality upon our return, my head was filled with crisp, new encounters begging to be shared. At the Spring Cottonwood Art Festival, Richardson, TX, we were deluged with rain and collectors brave enough to face the downpour. The rain failed to dampen our enthusiasm as we rolled on to the Texas Arts and Crafts Fair in Kerrville, TX. As the only official art show limited to Texas artists, it was an honor to be awarded *Best In Category* for my work.



Escaping from the scorching mid-summer Texas heat and unrelenting drought in July, the highly ranked Ruidoso Art Festival beckoned from the cool of the New Mexico mountains. A jewel of a show, it has quickly become one of our favorites. There, the outstanding quality of exhibitors made a second *Best In Category* award even more significant to me. And accompanying the award is an automatic acceptance into next year's show....Hooray! Finding mountains to be

the 'escape that refreshes', in September we packed up again for Copper Mountain, CO (Copper Country Art and Music Festival) and Castle Rock Artfest south of Denver. New for us, Castle Rock was another group of exceptional artists and fresh exposure to a knowledgeable group of collectors. It was a wonderful surprise to find friends from around the region making the trek to see us at this elite little show.

Crowning the year was the Fall Cottonwood Art Festival (did I mention rain?) and then the Bayou Art Festival in Downtown Houston. What a great way to end our 'show' year. We often leave our final show near the point of exhaustion, but the exhilaration this year more than compensates for the fatigue. We are left with such enthusiasm from seeing our collectors again that the months until we see you once more seem to be lacking in substance.

The other incredible news is that I have been invited to do an exhibit of my work at the magnificent new Art Museum at the Cultural Heritage Center in Arusha, Tanzania. Newly completed, this 35,000 sq. foot museum is destined to become the finest presentation of African art in the world.

The dates and events surrounding this exhibit, including workshops with the children in local schools, are still being worked out. You can be certain I will have it posted on my website as soon as we have a firm schedule.

That brings me back to you and the works burning in my mind. This is not a treadmill, this is a fantastic journey of discovery and joy in the wonders of Nature to share with you. If only my pens could go as fast as my brain is spinning!

"Bad To The Bone"





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
